

**CITY COUNCIL MEETING
MINUTES
Monday, May 11, 2015
7:00 p.m.**

Mayor Silvis called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. City Administrator, Susan Trout, took roll call with the following members present: Councilman Vesely, Councilman Eger, Councilwoman McCormick, Councilman Finfrock and Mayor Silvis. City Solicitor, Bernard McArdle, and City Treasurer/Fiscal Director, Mary Perez, were also present.

*****BIDS***Milling of City Streets.** Ms. Trout, "We accepted bids until 11:00 this morning. Having reviewed the proposals we received for approximately 19,000 square yards of milling with Rick Hoyle, we recommend Council consider awarding the contract to the low bidder, Donegal Construction, at a price of \$1.79 per square yard and a total price of \$34,010."

*****COMMENTS/BUSINESS FROM THE FLOOR*****

Joseph Kukosky, 25 Meadowbrook Avenue, Greensburg, PA. Mr. Kukosky, "I want to thank you for letting me have the privilege to speak this evening. I moved to Greensburg eight years ago, and I found it a great place to retire; for anyone to live in Greensburg, specifically what is referred to as the Northmont section. But in these last eight years there was a disturbing trend in our neighborhood and that's the non-compliance with residential ordinances, specifically trash cans being left out. For instance, our trash is picked up on Monday morning and I understand the Ordinance says that cans should be put out the day before and picked up say by 7:00 Monday evening. I took a walk on Wednesday, April 1st, in my neighborhood and I counted 75 trash cans out on the curb, in the driveways, in the front lawn; half-filled again, very unsightly and sad to see. Not only that but it blows throughout the neighborhood and cans were in the street and it invites rodents and all kinds of animals. I don't see any reason for it. I have some elderly neighbors in their 80s; they don't do it. The second thing I noticed was grass not being cut; way shabby, very unsightly. I love animals. I've always had a dog but it's been a long, hard winter;

we all know that and you like to have your windows open, fresh air and all you hear is dogs howling throughout the day and evening. Very disturbing. And, finally, automobiles. Cars parked on the wrong side of the road daily; up against Stop Signs daily; cars traveling much too fast for conditions. As you know we don't have sidewalks. People are pushing their babies in carriages, walking their dogs; dangerous. But what's disturbing, Chief, I have the utmost respect for law enforcement, I really do, but when I see patrol cars passing two or three times a day driving by and doing nothing for months, I have to ask why. And I'm not alone because a few months ago I met a businessman who has several businesses here and just by coincidence he said 'my employees that live in Greensburg mentioned the same thing you said. What's going on in Greensburg?' I do know my taxes are going up and I know the quality of life is going down."

Mayor Silvis, "Your City taxes aren't going up."

Councilwoman McCormick, "We haven't raised taxes."

Mr. Kukosky, "Not the City? School taxes; I'm sorry that's what I mean. And who knows what other taxes will be going up. But you see what I'm saying. If I don't stand here today with a lot of supporters who aren't here, what is my neighborhood going to be like in eight years from now? We, as people, have to clean up our act, but someone is getting paid to enforce ordinances, and, darn it, I want them enforced. I don't care about any excuses, because there are no excuses for anything I just mentioned. That's all I have to say."

Mayor Silvis, "My two neighbors put their garbage together and their cans are still out. So I can appreciate what you're saying."

Mr. Kukosky, "I have a list of every one....."

Mayor Silvis, "I can appreciate what you're saying and that's not right."

Mr. Kukosky, "Everyone talks about the problem, Mayor, from the White House on down. We know what the problem is; we want action. People want action. And, if we don't get any action, then there will be empty seats there, I promise."

Mayor Silvis, "Well, thank you for coming."

Mr. Kukosky, "Well, thank you for letting me speak. I'd like to hear and see in the future, and I will spread the word, because many people know I'm here tonight, and while I'm here as a friend of Council....."

Mayor Silvis, "People put their garbage out and then they go to work. And then they come home, which they should then take it in."

Mr. Kukosky, "By Wednesday it's still filled out in the streets."

Ms. Trout, "That shouldn't be happening."

Mr. Kukosky, "It's ugly and it's not just the Northmont section, like I said, it's Greensburg. Greensburg is turning into a 'hood' and I hope something gets done about it."

Mayor Silvis, "Thank you."

Mr. Kukosky, "Thank you, Mayor."

Sue Rule, 62 Barry Court, Greensburg, PA. Ms. Rule, "I live on Barry Court in Northmont. I've been there 32 years and I'm happy with the neighborhood or I obviously would have left. My concerns, too, I understand the gentleman before with the garbage which is true, but my concern is, I know it was brought up with Cranston Drive the parking between November and March, those people had to stay away because of clearing. Well our streets, Glenview and Meadowbrook, are pretty narrow streets. On these two streets everyone with the exception of two have driveways, garages and back around the back of the house to put cars. There are some cars that sit on those streets all winter long and never move. The snow just covers, covers and covers. The plows can't get by. They have to go around them and they sit there and they're frozen all winter long. I know there are some elderly people that don't drive in the winter. They probably leave their car but they can put them in a driveway. They can put it down around back. I don't know if they all use their garages. It's really a safety concern now. Also, on

Meadowbrook Avenue, where Mr. Hoyle lives and the group home next to it, there are two handicapped signs there for the group home and for Mr. Hoyle, which is perfectly fine. At the bend coming towards Meadowbrook, coming towards the high school, there is a telephone pole which one of our police officer's sons took out a couple of years ago flying around the corner going awfully fast, and boom hit the telephone pole because cars are parked on that bend. I can't believe there haven't been more accidents there. Then you proceed on Meadowbrook and going around the corner, 58, I don't know; they have a slew of cars parked there. It's just these corners that are so bad; the straightaways pretty much everybody can see. The corners are too narrow and with too many cars. It would be different if it was one car but there's one, two, three, four, so you have no chance of getting around. I understand the group homes and the handicapped, but there is no reason for those other cars to be on those bends. I've called the department one time. Now I call Mr. Zilli at the high school and tell him there are kids flying around the corner. He goes and he gets them and takes away their driving privileges to high school. We shouldn't have to go through the principal of the school. I know they set a patrol car there and they put a dummy in it. Those kids know. They get one phone call; they all call, 'the dummy's sitting there', which you know it's funny because you know what he is."

Mayor Silvis, "The first time I saw that I hit the brakes. I wasn't going fast, but I looked and I realized that's a dummy."

Ms. Rule, "They do know; these kids aren't, you know, but we had one just two weeks ago. He came 60 miles an hour past the houses and Mr. Zilli took care of it and he doesn't come by anymore. He's lost his privileges for driving to school, but it shouldn't have to go through the high school. These kids ought to know that on these side streets somebody is watching them in the mornings. It could be from 7:25 to 7:40 and then they're gone."

Mayor Silvis, "I don't know why parents let their children drive to school anyway. We have busing."

Ms. Rule, "Will the high school eliminate that? Probably not."

Mayor Silvis, "Well some of them work."

Ms. Rule, "So I'm hoping that some of those cars that sit there all winter, I understand if they don't have off-street parking. We're fortunate; the people in town have to park on the street, but in that neighborhood in Northmont they don't have to."

Mayor Silvis, "We'll check it out."

Ms. Rule, "I'm hoping it can be addressed. Thank you very much."

Philly Spisso, 208 Kenneth Street, Greensburg, PA. Ms. Spisso, "I just moved back. I've been here two weeks. I've lived in San Diego for 25 years; now that's a real change but that's how much I want to come back to Greensburg. This is where my roots are, my family is and that's how much I care about the City. I purchased 208, the Bartholomew home, and I'm going to restore it. Just in response to what this fellow said Northmont is north of me. Just listening to him, the compassion or the empathy or whatever came out; perhaps not every resident in Greensburg is aware of what the ordinances are. Maybe that's part of the problem. So what I'm suggesting, I know we only have 9,500, I checked it out and I know what our population is and what our boundaries are, so what I'm suggesting is perhaps there could be reminders. I don't know if this fits anywhere in a budget but there could be a Greensburg City letter that could go out, postage free, in the mailbox as a reminder once a month; these are the trash day pickups; what times; etc. so you can't come back and say because not knowing the law is not proof of, you know what I'm saying. So it's a reminder and it may even serve to strengthen the community because it could be done as a newsletter of what activities are going on in the community. It could just go out once a month to every resident. To me that's like a solution to his problem. Or, maybe not a solution, but at least it's going to start a solution because maybe everybody doesn't know what the ordinances are. In fact, then it's almost like a warning; you

have been pre-warned. So when the police come down and they see this; you know ignorance is not from the law. It's no excuse. Everybody knows the same stuff. That's all I want to say for now. You'll hear more about me."

Ms. Trout, "First of all everything is listed on our website and on the front page there are reminders of things going on that month. So that already exists; not to say we couldn't do more, but, also, Waste Management, who is our hauler, lists the information on their bill. I don't believe it's there every month, but it's there periodically."

Ms. Spisso, "Do they list the ordinances? I'd like to have a newsletter-type of thing that includes everything."

Ms. Trout, "The ordinances are on the website."

Ms. Spisso, "I know but computer-wise, I'm 62 years old. I do have a computer but there are not a whole lot of people that have a computer and I certainly wouldn't go on a computer to look something like that up. It would be more of a community thing to have a news thing you could clip to your calendar every month; this is what's going on in the City."

Ms. Trout, "In order to send that out to everybody, to place in the mailbox it would require postage, because that's a Federal law."

Ms. Spisso, "Well let's raise the money to do it. I'm here; I will start it. Here I am. I just told you I wouldn't do this, but whatever it takes. If you can find out what the cost would be I'll put up the first month. That's all I'm saying and I think I can get somebody to match it."

Ms. Trout, "Thank you."

Mayor Silvis, "Thank you."

*****APPROVAL OF LAST MONTH'S COUNCIL MINUTES*****Councilman Finfrock **MOVED** to approve the minutes from last month's Council Meeting, and Councilman Vesely **SECONDED**. No discussion. **Unanimously all voted in favor.**

*****APPROVAL OF MONTHLY BILL LIST*****Councilman Finfrock **MOVED** to approve the monthly bill list and pay the bills as the money becomes available, and Councilman Vesely **SECONDED**. No discussion. **Unanimously all voted in favor.**

*****REPORTS OF COUNCIL*****

Councilman Eger, "The Recreation Department will start taking registrations for our Cheerleading program. Returning cheerleaders are given an opportunity to sign up May 18th through June 8th. After June 8th registration will be open for new participants. This will be limited to the first girls that there are openings for. The program cost is \$45. Football registration will begin on June 1st. The cost for this program is \$65. This is for ages 6-12 years old. There are three age divisions and a weight limit for each division. For more information, please call the Recreation Office at 724-834-4880. The 7th annual Wayne Johnson Memorial Golf Outing will be held at Mt. Odin Golf Course on Friday, May 22nd. The cost is \$65 per person which includes golf with cart, food, beverages, complimentary gift, door prizes, skill prizes and team prizes. Registration forms are available at City Hall, Mt. Odin Pro Shop, and the Recreation Office and on the City's website at www.greensburgpa.org. There are sponsorship opportunities for businesses and individuals and the proceeds benefit Greensburg Recreation. The new main filter system pump has arrived at the Veterans' Memorial Pool and is installed. Several new supports for the slide that need replaced have been ordered and the new pool vac pump has been installed. The baby pool needed a new electrical panel and is now in working order. The Greensburg YMCA has set up the opening day for the pool for May 30th. Nevin Arena is closed for ice skating for the summer and will reopen to the public following Labor Day. There are several events scheduled in the arena for the off-season. Hempfield Area High

School has their annual band banquet scheduled for May 16th. Routine maintenance in the arena is in place and ongoing throughout the off-season. USA Hockey has reported the highest number of participants in its 78-year history at 600,000 youth players. Our youth hockey team, Westmoreland Hockey, had tryouts in April and will have 14 teams in place for the 2015-2016 season. That concludes my report."

Councilwoman McCormick, "On Monday, April 27th, the Street Department began working the summer work shift. The normal hours of operation will be from 6:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. These hours will be observed until the end of September. The boom flail mower had an early start for cutting right-of-ways. This machine is very active now in an attempt to manage the rapid growth of weeds and high grass. The paint crew spent several days recently at Lynch Field repainting all of the parking spaces. Because these lines were so badly worn the work involved laying out the whole project before painting commenced. During the next several months traffic painting will continue throughout the town as weather permits. With the bid being awarded tonight for milling several streets it is hoped this work will be started before the end of the month so the Street Department can immediately begin resurfacing them. It is estimated this will take approximately 16 days to complete. Thank you, Mayor."

Mayor Silvis, "Did you see South Dakota on the news; 13 inches of snow!"

Councilwoman McCormick, "Well, thank goodness, we don't live in South Dakota. And, Mayor, may I just add something here as a suggestion. Sometimes as a good neighbor, and I'm not saying we all want to be good neighbors, but we had a problem next door with the person cutting their grass and blowing their grass out onto the street. It was clogging the storm drain on our street. My husband went over and said 'you probably aren't aware there is an ordinance against doing that, and as a good neighbor would you mind blowing it into and mulching it in your yard'? And he said he wasn't aware of it. He had just come back to the neighborhood. So sometimes people aren't aware and maybe as a good neighbor you can give them the information."

Mayor Silvis, "Thank you."

Councilman Vesely-See attached Planning Department Report.

Councilman Finfrock-See attached Fiscal Department Report. Councilman Finfrock continued, "That 7% decrease when you translate that to real dollars turns out to be about \$550,000 which is a big number to overcome. It can be found in two categories. It can be found in the Wage Tax, a little bit in the Wage Tax, and \$450,000 of it is found in Property Tax. We received today \$508,000 in Property Tax. So that offsets that. So next month we should be in fairly decent shape. We may even be ahead of the game. It doesn't help us for the time of this report but long-term it's okay. The concern is while you can live with that in April and May, you can't live with that in December, so we've got to make sure that doesn't happen; we don't get into that situation in December. Other than that it's not as bad as it appears. We're actually in decent shape."

*****MAYOR'S REPORT*****

- a. **Code, Fire and Police Reports.** Mayor Silvis reviewed the Code, Fire and Police Reports. Copies of these reports may be obtained at the respective offices or the City Administration Office.
- b. **Greensburg Community Days -May 21-24, 2015.** Ms. Trout, "This year marks the 21st anniversary of Greensburg Community Days. Highlights include all the traditional

events everyone has come to love and expect each year from Swank's carnival rides, a variety of craft and food vendors, and free live music and entertainment. Also, the Fire Department will be on hand Saturday and Sunday conducting children's activities and promoting their 'Adopt-A-Hydrant' program; and on Saturday from 1:00-4:00 p.m. the Police Department will be promoting helmet safety through the 'Hard Head Program' offering helmets and fittings to kids. We encourage everyone to come out and enjoy the festivities; hopefully, there will be sun, sun, sun, sun, and everybody will have fun. Fireworks at 9:30 Saturday night; they're always the best!"

- c. **Westmoreland County Veteran's Monument Unveiling and Dedication.** Ms. Trout, "The statue that previously stood on the grounds of the Westmoreland Museum of American Art is scheduled to be dedicated and unveiled at its new location in Courthouse Square on Memorial Day, Monday, May 25th, at 1:00 p.m., and the public is invited to attend."
Mayor Silvis, "I went to the Courthouse today and this is not a Courthouse employee, but a fellow stopped me on the street; he didn't know who I was, not that it should matter, and he said 'that statue is too big'. Okay, it's too big."
- d. **SummerSounds 2015.** Ms. Trout, "The first outdoor concert of Greensburg's popular Friday evening concert series is scheduled at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, June 5th. The performance at the beautiful Robertshaw Amphitheater in St. Clair Park is sure to be wonderful and a huge crowd-pleaser. It's featuring 'Beatlemania Now!'."

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES

Bill No. 5 – AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 151, ENTITLED, 'FEES' OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG, ORDINANCE NO. 1646. Ms. Trout, "Introduction of the Bill amends the fees for the Ice Skating Institute (ISI) Skating Camp group lessons from \$45 to \$60 and the ISI Tot Skating group program from \$45 to \$60. The length of both programs shall be increased from six weeks to eight weeks. Again, this is an introduction."

Bill No. 6 – AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 249 OF ORDINANCE NO. 1647 ENTITLED, 'VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC' OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG. Ms. Trout, "This is prompted by a petition and a redevelopment project. As you all recall Sal Cerra was here at last month's meeting with a petition from Brown Avenue. The purpose of the introduction is to amend Schedule VI under Section 240-62, entitled 'One-Way Streets' changing the listing for Brown Avenue from its intersection from Westminster Avenue to College Avenue as one-way east to be listed as Brown Avenue from the eastern-most boundary at 245 Brown Avenue as one-way east to the intersection with College Avenue. In our Schedule we don't list two-way streets; we list one-way streets. So all we're doing is amending so you can go two-way on Brown from Westminster to Sal's property, 245 Brown."

Chief Lyons, "One hundred feet east."

Ms. Trout, "It's the way it's listed in the Schedule, Wally. I can see you looking like you think it's wrong."

Chief Lyons, "The one-way is west; not east."

Ms. Trout, "It might be incorrect in the Schedule. Everybody understands though in the introduction what we're trying to do; go two-way from Westminster on Brown from there all the way to 245 Brown Avenue. Just to that location; two-way and still remaining one-way if you go off College Avenue. Does everybody get it? Okay, I want to make sure. We'll go back and look at the wording and make sure it is right."

COUNCIL APPROVAL

- a. **Hiring of Seasonal Recreation Employees.** Ms. Trout, "Council approval accepts a recommendation from the Golf Professional for the hiring of Joe Leo, Patrick Boyer, Nicholas Alwine at Mt. Odin Pro Shop at a rate of \$7.25 per hour; and from the Golf Course Superintendent we have a recommendation to hire Ian McKlveen, Erik Angiolieri and Jeffrey Livengood as Mt. Odin Maintenance at a rate of \$8.25 per hour. Also, Christopher Burkley and Zachary Gazze are recommended by the Superintendent of Parks and Recreation to be hired as seasonal Lynch Field maintenance employees at a rate of \$8.25 per hour. All employees will begin on an as-needed basis. That's your current slate."
Councilman Eger **MOVED** to approve the hiring of the seasonal recreation employees, and Councilwoman McCormick **SECONDED**. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the hiring of the seasonal recreation employees.
- b. **Wage Amendment for Five (5) Seasonal Recreation Employees.** Ms. Trout, "Council approval would increase the wage of Adam Indof, Scott Fidazzo, Matt Greenawalt, Jeremy Garriss and James Holtzer from the rate hired at \$7.25 per hour to the rate of \$8.25 per hour retroactive to their original start dates in 2015. I'll take responsibility for this being an error on last month's agenda."
Councilman Eger **MOVED** to approve the wage amendment, and Councilman Finfrock **SECONDED**. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve.
- c. **Hiring of Full-time Laborer in the Department of Public Works.** Ms. Trout, "Rick Hoyle and I conducted interviews this past week and we would like to recommend Council approve the hiring of Donald Lee Fencil, a resident of the City and a Greensburg volunteer fireman, who meets the qualifications with the necessary skillset and experience for the Teamsters Local 30 position. He also has a Commercial Driver's License (CDL) 'Class A', we require a 'Class B'. His effective start date would be May 26, 2015 at the entry-level rate for a Laborer as set by the contract and the 2015 Wage Ordinance at \$17.24 per hour. And Don is back here in the audience."
Mayor Silvis, "Did I have you in school?"
Donald Fencil, "Yes."
Ms. Trout, "Did you recognize him?"
Mayor Silvis, "No, I recognize the name."
Councilwoman McCormick **MOVED** to approve the hiring, and Councilman Vesely **SECONDED**.
Councilwoman McCormick, "I made the motion because we've been very short-handed."
No further discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the hiring.
- d. **Reappointment to the Planning Commission.** Ms. Trout, "Council approval accepts the reappointment to another 4-year term of John Munsch to the Planning Commission effective until May 12, 2019."
Councilman Vesely **MOVED** to approve the reappointment, and Councilman Eger **SECONDED**. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the reappointment.

- e. **Reappointment to the Civil Service Commission.** Ms. Trout, "Council approval accepts the reappointment of Jeff Anzovino to the Commission for another 4-year term until May 12, 2019."
Councilman Eger **MOVED** to approve the reappointment, and Councilman Vesely **SECONDED**. No discussion. **All voted unanimously to approve the reappointment.**
- f. **Slate of Projects Recommended by the Historic and Architectural Review Board (HARB) for Issuance of Certificates of Appropriateness.** Ms. Trout, "Council approval is for one (1) property located in the Downtown District at 129 North Pennsylvania Avenue owned by the *Westmoreland Bar Association* for which David DeRose, Esq. is the applicant for façade improvements. In the Gateway District, *Diane Repasky* is the applicant for façade improvements at 626 North Main Street owned by Premier Property Holdings LLC; and Bob Gonze from Sign-a-Rama is the applicant for signage at 121 West Pittsburgh Street which is owned by *Steve Thomas*. This is your current slate up for approval."
Councilman Vesely **MOVED** to approve the slate of projects recommended for issuance of Certificates of Appropriateness, and Councilman Finfrock **SECONDED**. No discussion. **All voted unanimously to approve the slate of projects.**
- g. **Intergovernmental Rental Agreement between the City of Greensburg and the Borough of South Greensburg.** Ms. Trout, "Council approval accepts the terms of the agreement for the City's occasional use of a backhoe/auger owned by the Borough at a rate of \$45 per hour commencing upon execution by both parties effective until December 31, 2020 unless they no longer have ownership of the equipment or either party chooses to terminate the agreement with sixty (60) days written notice."
Solicitor McArdle, "This agreement is the exact same terms as the agreement that Council approved last month where Greensburg leases the bucket truck to South Greensburg; a mirror image of that agreement."
Ms. Trout, "So we can share."
Councilman Eger **MOVED** to approve the agreement, and Councilman Finfrock **SECONDED**. No further discussion. **All voted unanimously to approve.**
- h. **Conservation Partnership Agreement between the Westmoreland Conservation District and the City of Greensburg.** Ms. Trout, "Council approval accepts the agreement that is being put in place to protect our streams and waterways and conserve our natural resources by setting forth terms of compliance and responsibilities in regard to storm water discharges associated with construction activities, soil erosion, and sediment pollution control, and reviews and exemptions of the same. We've had a longstanding relationship with the Conservation District. This just details our relationship."
Councilman Finfrock **MOVED** to approve the agreement, and Councilwoman McCormick **SECONDED**. No discussion. **All voted unanimously to approve.**

- i. **Designation of Voting Delegate for the 116th Annual Convention of the Pennsylvania Municipal League (PML).** Ms. Trout, "Council approval designates the City Administrator, Susan Trout, as the Voting Delegate for this year's convention that will be held at the PPL Center Renaissance. That's in Allentown, Pennsylvania from June 23rd to 25th. The designated voting delegate will also serve on the PML Resolutions Committee."


Councilman Vesely **MOVED** to approve the designation of the voting delegate, and Councilman Finfrock **SECONDED**. No discussion. **All voted unanimously to approve the designation of the voting delegate.**

- j. **Golf Course Specials.** Ms. Trout, "Council approval allows the Golf Professional to run the following specials at the course from now until December 31, 2015. The idea is to give him latitude for marketing purposes. The 'Senior Special' at \$22 for 18 holes with a cart on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays; 'BOGO Greens Fee Special' with a purchase of a golf cart; the 'Weekend Twilight Rate' at \$24 for 18 holes with a cart after 3:00 p.m.; the 'Thursday Kids Special' where one (1) child golfs free with a paying adult; the 'Friday Foursome Special' at \$96 for 18 holes with a cart; the 'College Rate' at \$24 for 18 holes with a cart on weekdays only; and the 'Fall Rate' at \$22 for 18 holes with a cart. I had also told you that the 'Golf Now' rate for \$24 had to be included, but that was already in the form of an ordinance with a range so we didn't need that one for approval."

Councilman Eger **MOVED** to approve the specials, and Councilman Vesely **SECONDED**. No discussion. **All voted unanimously to approve the specials.**

*****ADJOURNMENT***** Mayor Silvis **MOVED** to adjourn the meeting.

CITY COUNCIL REPORT

FROM THE PLANNING DEPARTMENT

Good evening!

The Greensburg Community Development Corporation (GCDC) and the City of Greensburg Planning Department will work together in the development of a new community revitalization program that utilizes the Local Economic Revitalization Tax Assistance Program (LERTA) and an agreement with commercial property owners. The combined programs will provide an incentive for commercial property owners investing into the improvement of commercial buildings while creating a fund to renovate deteriorated buildings within the City. If the GCDC and the City determine this proposal will have a positive Impact on the City of Greensburg, then it will be introduced to all three taxing bodies for consideration of adoption.

A LERTA program allows local municipalities, school districts, and counties to abate up to 100% of the real estate taxes on improvements to real property for up to 10 years. The proposed LERTA district will include the boundaries of the City in which all commercial and/or industrial properties will be eligible to

participate. This real estate tax abatement program applies to improvements (renovations, new construction, etc.) that are completed. Many communities across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania use the LERTA Act as a method to provide a financial incentive to a property owner making an improvement to an existing commercial building or a vacant lot.

"Improvements" mean repair, construction, reconstruction, alterations or additions having the effect of rehabilitating a deteriorated property, either commercial or residential, so that it becomes habitable or attains higher standards of safety, health, economic use or amenity, or is brought into compliance by laws, ordinances or regulations governing such standards. Ordinary upkeep and maintenance shall not be deemed an improvement and should not result in an increased assessed value and taxation.

The City, the County and the Greensburg Salem School District enacted a LERTA program that existed from 1994 to 2004. During this time period, the Troutman Building at 200 South Main Street and the Stark Building at 41 West Otterman Street were the only two commercial properties within the Main Street District that used the LERTA program to assist with financing the renovation of each property.

Please note that a property owner participating in the LERTA program will continue to pay existing real estate taxes on the property (and an increased

level of taxes on a vacant lot that is converted to an improved lot), but they will not be fully taxed on the improvements until the abatement time period ends. And, improvements that do not result in an increased assessed value on the subject property will not qualify for LERTA.

LERTA will only be granted when a LERTA application accompanies a building permit. Benefits will not be applied retroactively to projects started without the proper permits. To ensure property owners receive the benefit of the tax abatement, the City of Greensburg files the LERTA Application and a copy of the approved Building Permit with the Westmoreland County Tax Assessors Office on behalf of the property owner prior to the start of new construction/renovations. The City of Greensburg Planning Director and staff members of the City's Planning Department Office will assist property owners and/or their contractors with this process.

A unique component of the Greensburg LERTA program will be the inclusion of an agreement with the commercial property owner who seeks to receive tax benefits under the program. The GCDC is examining the potential to utilize the real property tax revenue that would've otherwise been exempt through the LERTA to invest in priority downtown projects. The property owners who receive these exemptions would make payments to a fund that will be

established by the GCDC and Local Taxing Bodies in amounts that are related to a portion of the exempted taxes.

The intent of this agreement is to create a sustainable funding mechanism that will continue to facilitate revitalization of the City. The commercial property owner will return a portion of the exemption which will be paid into a locally controlled Greensburg Redevelopment Fund. Proposed uses of the fund include the acquisition of deteriorated commercial buildings, necessary building renovations and district-wide infrastructure improvements. All of these proposed uses are noted in the City's Comprehensive Plan, Main Street Revitalization Strategy and the Health Care District revitalization strategy along with future Community Development Block Grant application.

I am only speaking for myself, but I think that Mayor & the rest of my fellow Council members find this a very intriguing program. I am very hopeful that it will create a synergy between all three taxing bodies as we work together to bring more reinvestment into our City and hopefully create higher assessed values which will in turn help all of our budgets in the future.

This concludes my report.


