CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES Monday, July 13, 2015 7:00 p.m.

Mayor Silvis called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. City Treasurer/Fiscal Director, Mary Perez, took roll call with the following members present: Councilman Vesely-via phone, Councilman Eger, Councilwoman McCormick, Councilman Finfrock and Mayor Silvis. City Solicitor, Bernard McArdle, was also present. City Administrator, Susan Trout, was absent.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCECouncilwoman McCormick

COMMENTS/BUSINESS FROM THE FLOOR

Karen Hutchinson, 337 Alexander Avenue, Greensburg, PA. Ms. Hutchinson, "I know Les isn't here today and I know he's retiring, and I just think it's important that people understand what we're losing when we're losing Les. He is very important. He has saved countless lives in the City and I don't think people really appreciate that because you don't see it. He saves them behind the scenes where nobody ever sees it, and what we're going to lose with his knowledge and experience is really a shame. I wanted to thank him for his years of service to the City. I also want to say I think it's a tragic mistake that you're taking his position and putting it in another department; even though they are similar, they are not the same departments. It should not be under another director; it should be an independent position that answers directly to the Mayor. It is not a small position. While you may think everything the way it is right now will be fine you have to look down the line. What's it going to be in the future? Who's going to be running things? You don't want to be in a position where this position could be influenced or have any pressure put on it. And I do think it's a terrible mistake to change that position. That's my personal opinion. It was designed that way by Bob Bell when he was Mayor, and that was a result of many fires and fire deaths in the City of Greensburg and I just think it's something you really should consider."

Mayor Silvis, "I tried to talk him into not retiring because I don't know how old Les is. Les isn't that old; he's not as old as I am."

Councilwoman McCormick, "But I think she's referring, Mayor, to"

Ms. Hutchinson, "The position."

Councilwoman McCormick, "And keeping them separate which I agree."

Ms. Hutchinson, "Absolutely. It's not a position that should be just lumped in with other positions. It should be an independent position that should not have any influence over it." Mayor Silvis, "We'll look at that definitely."

Ms. Hutchinson, "It really is important. You have to realize you're saving lives; you're not just saving a buck here and there. It's a very important position."

Mayor Silvis, "Very good; thank you, Karen."

APPROVAL OF LAST MONTH'S COUNCIL MINUTESCouncilman Eger MOVED to approve the minutes from last month's Council Meeting, and Councilman Finfrock SECONDED. No discussion. Unanimously all voted in favor.

APPROVAL OF MONTHLY BILL LISTCouncilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the monthly bill list and pay the bills as the money becomes available, and Councilman Eger SECONDED. No discussion. Unanimously all voted in favor.

REPORTS OF COUNCIL

Councilman Eger, "The Recreation Department is accepting registrations for our Youth Football Program. This is for ages 6-12 years old. The player must turn 6 years old before May 1st and cannot turn 13 before May 1st. The fee is \$65 per participant. There are still some open spots in our Cheerleading Program on the Junior Varsity (JV) squad. This would be for 9-10 year old participants. Registration has started for our Fall Baseball Program. This is for players 7-14 years old. The fee is \$55 for residents and \$65 for non-residents. Practices will begin in mid-August and games will be played in September and October. On Saturday, July 18th, please join us at the 20th annual ParentWISE Ice Cream Blast inside the Kirk S. Nevin Arena. The event will be held from noon-4:00 p.m. The cost is \$5 for adults and \$3 for children, which includes cake and ice cream. There will be entertainment, games, crafts and basket raffles. This event is sponsored by the City of Greensburg and Lynch Field Dairy Queen, and that concludes my report."

Councilwoman McCormick, "Before I do my report I just want to commend Rick Hoyle and the Public Works Department because the streets that have been payed so far look excellent and they're not even sealed yet. Considering how much rain we've had I've watched the men work through the raindrops and it's been a really difficult task this summer. So let me proceed; the milling contractor completed work on Wednesday, June 10th, and the Street Department began paying the next day. To date, all but two of the streets have been finished and it is expected they will be completed this week, weather permitting. The work at getting all the streets paved has been a long, drawn-out process due to, of course, the unusually rainy weather. We were delayed on two of the streets that were milled because the Municipal Authority of Westmoreland County (MAWC) had to repair waterline breaks. Their work to restore the street openings was just recently completed. Once paying is finished the employees will begin to seal all the streets that were done and they will repaint the traffic markings as required. The contractor who performs spraying for the controlled vegetation growth at many locations throughout town finished this work on Saturday. The completion of this work was also delayed because of the rainy weather. The new one-ton dump truck that was ordered for the Street Department was delivered today. I'm sure you're very happy about that, Rick. This truck will be placed in service once it has been thoroughly gone over by the mechanics and the requested materials have been installed. That concludes my report, Mayor."

Councilman Vesely-See attached Planning Department Report.

Councilman Finfrock, "Before I give my report I would like to echo the comments that Karen Hutchinson made concerning the gentleman who has given close to 40 years of his talents and his life to the City of Greensburg. He will be missed not only as the Building Code Enforcement Officer but I worked with him when I was on the Fire Department Relief Association as the liaison with the City Fire Department; the conversations and the learning that took place there was very much appreciated, and I will miss him. I will not miss him as a friend though because he invited me over to his porch for beers and I will be there. So if you're reading this, Les, good luck to you on your retirement. Thank you for your service and let me know when I can come over." See attached Fiscal Department Report. Councilman Finfrock continued, "We're still chasing the revenues. As long as we can keep expenses in line, which we're doing, maybe we can afford to miss the target on revenues, but I still would like to catch that up. That concludes my report."

MAYOR'S REPORT

Code, Fire and Police Reports. Mayor Silvis reviewed the Code, Fire and Police Reports. Copies of these reports may be obtained at the respective offices or the City Administration Office.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

Bill No. 8 – AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2044 THE 2015 WAGE ORDINANCE. Ms. Perez, "The purpose of the introduction is to add under Department One the position of Director of Emergency Management and annual salary of \$5,000. This change will take place on a pro rata basis effective August 8, 2015 to cover the remainder of 2015. And, again, this is just an introduction."

Bill No. 9 – AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG AMENDING ARTICLE VII ENTITLED, 'EXEMPTION FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN DETERIORATED AREAS' OF CHAPTER 240 ENTITLED 'TAXATION' OF ORDINANCE NO. 1646, THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG, PROVIDING FOR TAX EXEMPTION FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO ELIGIBLE PROPERTIES PURSUANT TO THE LOCAL ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION TAX ASSISTANCE (LERTA) ACT 76 OF 1977 DESIGNATING A DETERIORATED AREA; DEFINING ELIGIBLE PROPERTIES; ESTABLISHING A SCHEDULE AND GUIDELINES FOR EXEMPTION; PROVIDING FOR AN EXEMPTION TIME PERIOD; AND PROVIDING PROCEDURES FOR IMPLEMENTING EXEMPTIONS. Ms. Perez, "This is the Bill that Councilman Finfrock referred to in Councilman Vesely's report and is introduced in conjunction with the LERTA Public Hearing which was held at City Hall on July 7, 2015 at 5:00 p.m."

ADOPTION OF BILL AS ORDINANCE

Bill No. 7 as Ordinance No. 2052 – AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 1646, THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG, REMOVING IN ITS ENTIRETY CHAPTER 107, ENTITLED 'BICYCLES'. Ms. Perez, "Adoption of the Ordinance removes the chapter which is obsolete."

Councilman Finfrock MOVED to adopt Bill No. 7 as Ordinance No. 2052, and Councilwoman McCormick SECONDED. No discussion. Roll call vote was taken. All voted unanimously to adopt Bill No. 7 as Ordinance No. 2052.

ENACTMENT OF RESOLUTION

Resolution No. 1214 — A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG, COUNTY OF WESTMORELAND, IMPLEMENTING THE UPDATED AND CURRENT CITY OF GREENSBURG EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN (EOP) IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA'S EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT CODE (35 Pa. C.S. Section 7503) DIRECTIVE THAT EACH POLITICAL SUBDIVISION SHALL PREPARE, MAINTAIN AND KEEP CURRENT AN EOP WHICH SHALL BE ATTACHED HERETO AND MADE PART OF THIS RESOLUTION. Ms. Perez, "Enactment of the Resolution adopts the updated EOP which outlines basic operations and procedures to be implemented in the event of an incident either man-made or natural that requires a coordinated response."

Councilman Finfrock MOVED to enact Resolution No. 1214, and Councilman Eger SECONDED. No discussion. Roll call vote was taken. All voted unanimously to enact.

COUNCIL APPROVAL

- a. Hiring of Planning and Development Secretary. Ms. Perez, "Council approval accepts the hiring of Alycia Ferrett in the Department Three position effective August 3, 2015 at the annual salary of \$34,000 in accordance with the 2015 Wage Ordinance on a pro rata basis to cover the remainder of 2015."

 Councilman Vesely MOVED to approve the hiring, and Councilwoman McCormick SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the hiring.

 Ms. Perez, "Alycia is actually here back there. Welcome and congratulations!"
- b. Resignation of Part-time Certified Telecommunicator. Ms. Perez, "Council approval accepts the resignation of Amanda Barbish from the part-time position in the Police Department with an effective date of July 13, 2015."

 Councilman Eger MOVED to approve the resignation, and Councilman Finfrock SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the resignation.
- c. Slate of Projects Recommended by the Historic and Architectural Review Board (HARB) for Issuance of Certificates of Appropriateness. Ms. Perez, "Council approval is for three (3) properties located in the Historic and Downtown Districts: Bob Gonze of Sign-a-Rama is the applicant for RE/MAX for signage at 41 West Otterman Street owned by the Westmoreland Cultural Trust; Tracy Yates Maga of T Construction and Consulting Services, LLC is the applicant for a façade and signage project at 124 South Main Street owned by A.B. Mac Properties, LLC; and Bob Gonze of Sign-a-Rama is the applicant for a façade and signage project at 118 North Main Street owned by Sean Cassidy and David Pohland. We also have two (2) properties on the slate for approval that are located in the Gateway District: Jacob Granata is the applicant for Old Skool Tattoo at 702 West Otterman Street on property owned by Fred Petrella, and Christian Stein, CIE, LP is the applicant for Marathon Gas Company for demolition of a roof structure and gasoline dispensers at 555 East Pittsburgh Street on property owned by Ty Chi, of Odyssey Real Estate."

Councilman Vesely MOVED to approve the slate of projects recommended for issuance of Certificates of Appropriateness, and Councilwoman McCormick SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the slate of projects.

- d. Subdivision at 661 North Main Street for the Columbus Home Club. Ms. Perez, "Recommended unanimously for Council approval by the Planning Commission, the purpose of the subdivision is to separate the buildings in order to sell one building and maintain ownership of the other."

 Councilman Vesely MOVED to approve the subdivision, and Councilman Finfrock SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the subdivision.
- e. Site Plan/Land Development for a Press Box for Seton Hill University Soccer Field Located at One Seton Hill Drive. Ms. Perez, "The Planning Commission unanimously recommended Council vote to approve the site plan/land development for the press box." Councilman Vesely MOVED to approve the site plan/land development, and Councilman Finfrock SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the site plan/land development.

- f. Maintenance Agreement between the City of Greensburg and HUB Parking Technology USA Inc. for Parking Equipment at the J. Edward Hutchinson Parking Garage. Ms. Perez, "Council approval accepts renewal of the agreement for the period of July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016 in the amount of \$7,819 which is 3% more than last year's price."

 Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the maintenance agreement, and Councilwoman McCormick SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the maintenance agreement.
- g. Maintenance Agreement between the City of Greensburg and HUB Parking Technology USA Inc. for Parking Equipment at the Robert A. Bell Parking Garage. Ms. Perez, "Council approval accepts renewal of the agreement for the period of July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016 in the amount of \$9,058 which is also 3% more than last year's price."

 Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the maintenance agreement, and Councilman Eger SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve.
- h. Concessionaire Lease Agreement between the City of Greensburg and Danyell Bompiani d/b/a Bompy's Pizza, Subs and More for the Kirk S. Nevin Arena. Ms. Perez, "Council approval would accept the lease for a term to begin September 1, 2015 until April 30, 2017. This term would cover the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 ice seasons at the rink. Rent would be set at \$3,250 per season to be paid in four (4) equal installments of \$1,625 due December 1st and March 1st of each season." Councilman Eger MOVED to approve the concessionaire lease agreement, and Councilwoman McCormick SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the concessionaire lease agreement.
- i. Right-of-Way Agreement between the City of Greensburg and the MAWC for Mt. Odin Park and Golf Course. Ms. Perez, "Council approval authorizes the Mayor to execute on the City's behalf the agreement, upon favorable review of the documents by the City Solicitor, allowing the MAWC to install a 48-inch waterline at Mt. Odin Park." Solicitor McArdle, "The Municipal Authority wants to put in a line there that sort of edges the property. It doesn't affect playability or use of the park or golf course. We haven't gotten to the point where we have documents ready for execution. I haven't seen them yet and I don't think the City has received them. We're waiting on those from the Municipal Authority, and that's why this is on the agenda tonight." Councilman Eger MOVED to approve the right-of-way agreement as presented, and Councilwoman McCormick SECONDED. No further discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the right-of-way agreement as presented.
- j. Lease Agreement between the City of Greensburg and YMCA for 306-308 North Pennsylvania Avenue known as the Armory. Ms. Perez, "Council approval renews the lease for use of premises by the YMCA for continued recreational activities for an initial term of 99 years with an extension clause for an additional 99-year term in the amount of \$20 per year. After the first 10 years of the initial term, both parties shall have the right to terminate the lease for any reason upon a 6-month written notice. Under the terms of the lease, the YMCA shall provide insurance and agree to list the City as additional insured on all policies. The YMCA shall also be responsible for maintaining and paying all utilities servicing the premises, and shall, at its own expense, be responsible for maintaining the premises to include the roof, walls, windows, doors, floors, carpeting,

appliances and fixtures; the heating, ventilating and air conditioning (HVAC); utility lines; landscaping and parking areas to include removal of snow, ice, and refuse, in addition to lighting."

Solicitor McArdle, "You'll remember this is the property that's subject to a reversionary interest in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania should it ever cease to be used for recreational purposes. The lease specifically requires the YMCA to use this property for recreational activities to satisfy that reversionary interest."

Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the lease agreement, and Councilwoman McCormick SECONDED. No further discussion. All voted unanimously to approve.

Third Amendment to and Consent to Assignment of Parking Lease Pertaining to the k. Rental of 304 Parking Spaces to the Owner of Property at 144 North Main Street Known as the State Office Building. Ms. Perez, "Council approval would permit the Mayor to execute a Third Amendment to and Consent to Assignment of Parking Lease amending the Agreement of Lease dated May 8, 2006, as amended February 13, 2008, and again amended April 14, 2010, to clarify that rent may be increased as of August 1st of each year based upon annual increases in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for all Urban Consumers, Northeast Cities Index, as found in Table 11 of the CPI Detailed Report published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, published for the month of April in each year; to extend the original rental hours of 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.; to correct scrivener's errors contained in the prior amendment of April 14, 2010; and to consent to the assignment of the lease from the current owners to Government Properties Income Trust, a Maryland real estate investment trust, or any wholly-owned subsidiary thereto, including, without limitation, GPT Properties Trust, a Maryland real estate investment trust. Part of the consideration for the Third Amendment to and Consent to Assignment of Parking Lease is a payment of \$75,000 to the City of Greensburg when the assignment becomes effective." Solicitor McArdle, "Council will recall this matter originally was presented to the City as a request to execute an Estoppel Certificate containing an assignment of the lease. We are told the current owner is under contract to sell the property to a buyer and the buyer has been identified as Government Properties Income Trust which is a real estate investment trust located in Maryland. The transaction has evolved into an amendment of the lease which is the third amendment to the original 2006 lease and that amendment is before you for your consideration. This document is the product of much back and forth between myself and Attorney Demosky, who represents the seller's agent, CBRE; Mr. Demosky is here tonight if you have any questions. This Third Amendment to and Consent to Assignment of Parking Lease is before you for your consideration and provides in summary what Mary already read, but I'd like to review that. It provides for the right of the City to annually increase the rent charged to the owner, which is currently \$218,880, by the percentage of increase in the CPI as published by the Federal Government. Increases may not exceed 5% in any given year. The time the spaces can be occupied by the tenant is increased by one hour from 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. There are corrections of drafting errors in an earlier amendment from 2010. There will be an assignment of the lease from the current owner, Government Properties Income Trust, or a wholly-owned subsidiary of that trust, and there will be a payment made to the City of \$75,000 when the assignment takes place. This sum is in addition to any transfer taxes the City will receive on the transfer of the property. Now in the Third Amendment to and Consent to Assignment of Parking Lease it provides that the assignment is to this Government Properties Income Trust or a wholly-owned subsidiary of that trust which may be GPT Properties Trust. Now that's a little vague, maybe, about who the actual

assignee is going to be but my understanding is that in these kinds of transactions sometimes the actual owner or the purchaser of the property might be an entity that's not even formed until the time the transaction is consummated because sometimes these entities are formed just to own a particular piece of property. It may be that the entity hasn't fully been formed. I do believe that whatever entity it is, it is not registered with the Pennsylvania Department of State. The law requires that any association or any business trust must be registered with the Pennsylvania Department of State in order to do business in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Even foreign trusts and foreign associations must register with Pennsylvania. So this assignment will be subject to any legal registration requirements; which I'm not saying we should wait for because, again, that entity may not even exist as we speak, but it may be formed between now and the closing date on the transaction which has been represented to me as July 29th of this year. I recommend its approval."

Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the Third Amendment to and Consent to Assignment of Parking Lease, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No further discussion. All voted unanimously to approve.

ADJOURNMENTMayor Silvis MOVED to adjourn the meeting.

CITY COUNCIL REPORT

FROM THE PLANNING DEPARTMENT

Good evening!

As many of you are aware, the Greensburg Community Development Corporation (GCDC) and the City of Greensburg Planning Department proposed a new community revitalization program that utilizes the Local Economic Revitalization Tax Assistance (LERTA) law and a locally financed Greensburg Revitalization Fund. The combined programs will provide an incentive for commercial property owners investing into the improvement of commercial and industrial buildings while creating a fund to renovate deteriorated buildings within the City. The GCDC and the Planning Department have visited the School District and the County and now City is gearing up to start the approval process. This evening City Council is pleased to introduce the enabling ordinance. The LERTA allows local municipalities, school districts, and counties to provide exemption of up to 100% of the real estate taxes on improvements to real property for up to 10 years. The

proposed LERTA district will include the entire City and will be available to all commercial and industrial property owners.

This temporary real property tax exemption program applies to improvements (renovations, new construction, etc) that are completed to deteriorated properties. Many communities across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania use the LERTA as a method to provide a financial incentive to a property owner making an improvement to an existing commercial or industrial building or a vacant lot. Providing exemption only on incremental taxes resulting from improvements, the program would facilitate revitalization without impacting current real property tax revenues.

A unique component of the Greensburg LERTA program will be the inclusion of an agreement with the commercial property owner who seeks to receive tax benefits under the program. The property owner receiving an exemption will make annual payments to a fund established by the GCDC and local taxing bodies in amounts that are determined by community leaders and representatives of the three taxing bodies.

The intent of this agreement is to create a sustainable funding mechanism that will continue to facilitate revitalization of the City. The commercial or industrial property owner will return a portion of the exemption which will be paid into a locally controlled Greensburg Redevelopment Fund. Proposed uses of the

fund include the acquisition of deteriorated commercial buildings, necessary building renovations and district-wide infrastructure improvements. At this time I would like to thank Mike Pehr, from Duane Morris Government Strategies, the consulting firm that the GCDC hired to help us implement this planning tool, Steve Gifford, Executive Director of the GCDC, the entire GCDC board of directors and lastly the City Planning Director, Barb Ciampini. I am excited to be able to be a part of this new initiative.
