CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES Monday, May 9, 2016 7:00 p.m.

Mayor Bell called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. City Administrator, Susan Trout, took roll call with the following members present: Councilwoman Lennert, Councilman Vesely, Councilman Finfrock and Mayor Bell. City Solicitor, Bernard McArdle, and City Treasurer/Fiscal Director, Kelsye Milliron, were also present. Councilwoman McCormick was absent.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCEMayor Bell

BIDSMilling of City Streets. Mayor Bell, "Bids were received until this morning at 11:00 a.m. After reviewing the bids with the Superintendent of Streets, I recommend Council vote to accept the lowest bid from Donegal Construction Corporation for approximately 27,591 square yards of milling in the amount of \$34,488.75."

Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the lowest bid as presented, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No discussion. Unanimously all voted in favor to approve the bid.

COMMENTS/BUSINESS FROM THE FLOOR

Tom Gretok, 641 East Pittsburgh Street, Greensburg, PA. Mr. Gretok, "I wanted to find out about any thoughts that may have happened in the past couple of months of the minutes as to the light-emitting diode (LED) signs or any type of information as to has Council thought about anything more. I was here for the meeting with the attorneys on East Pittsburgh Street and I pretty much understand what happened and I understand their one-a-day allowance and things like that. I wanted to see if we're doing any more searching or looking at because I have some property and a year or so ago I found out where the permission was, 1,000 feet of Route 30, and I wasn't aware of that until I read it in the paper. I came and I asked about it and the previous Mayor said it was just presented and they approved it and he really couldn't help me out with anything. I guess the amount of work that went into it he thought was adequate or not but the property that I own on East Pittsburgh Street is just past where the attorneys are on the left-hand side where the UPS Store is and a shop that's trying to open up; a pizza eatery. I think that a few of the signs that are grandfathered in, the one by Rite Aid, I understand has been there for quite a while, and I feel because of my property that it's important that people are aware of what's happening at locations to help their business. I notice that I look and read that sign by the Rite Aid even though it doesn't apply to anything I'm looking for; I happen to read it every time I go by. I think a lot of other people do the same thing and I think it would help businesses and I know it will help the pizza shop when they eventually get open. They're having problems with some of the things they've had to do; it's taking longer to do things than they actually thought it would. I know we're going to come to that point where there's a small square sign below the main sign and they're going to want to have something on there to read what they're doing. You can put it up in some type of handwritten, and with good weather it will stay there for a day or

two, but you'd be changing it from maybe noon to evening or things like that. I just think that it would help businesses if they were more relaxed on the requirements for businesses. I don't know what the attorneys spent for their sign but I'm sure it was quite a few thousand and they were stuck with nothing until the gas station happened to come up with one and then Council agreed, 'okay we'll let you do it based on this, this and this', and that's better than nothing but I know that they're going to want to do something on the pizza store. And I ran into the same problem when I had an agency for almost eight months two years ago, three years ago, and the reason I started checking into it was that I thought well if I could put something on the UPS Store sign or put one in the center and they can both share it and I'll be able to advertise whatever is happening to get a tenant and it would've helped a lot if I had something like that. And I know that it's a historical issue but it's also a business issue. The taxes in Greensburg Salem are high enough and I know it's a small area so they have to be greater than Hempfield and Greater Latrobe and things like that so I've learned to live with it, but you can only ask for so much rent to justify the investment in property with taxes. They are a problem like all other school districts. They're increasing and they may ask for more than what the State allows. As taxes go up it's tougher to get tenants; it affects people that own property; it affects people that come in and can't afford to pay the rent that's necessary to make a good investment; and something doesn't happen. So I think that the signs where they're rotating are a thing of the future. They are and I think we're in a business area, especially in that area where there's a gas station; more than one, and there is all types of other businesses that need to let people know what's going on and what's happening. So to have certain areas of the City historical is fine where they're not affected by business people that need to advertise and do it more than just with Joe's Shop or whatever and we're on a major in, we're on four different areas, and I think Council should look at that. We're not living there; we're not off the highway. We're in a major in and out of the county seat and it tells a story when people see that this is there and they can stop and do this and do that and it just helps with more, a little bit more consideration." Solicitor McArdle, "Mr. Gretok we limit public comments to five minutes. You're beyond that so I'm going to ask you to wrap up your comments."

Mr. Gretok, "Has Council or the Authority researched any more thought on that?" Mayor Bell, "Planning and Development is working on that. They're trying to formulate and formalize an ordinance in regard to LED signs along the gateway and we haven't come up with the final version yet but I know they're working very diligently and they're speaking with other people in regard to other municipalities to find out what their ordinances are and we're trying to make it work for everybody. We have not come up with a formalized ordinance yet in that regard but they are working on it."

Mr. Gretok, "Okay, thank you."

Mayor Bell, "Thank you. I appreciate it."

APPROVAL OF LAST MONTH'S COUNCIL MINUTESCouncilman Vesely MOVED to approve the minutes from last month's Council Meeting, and Councilwoman Lennert SECONDED. No discussion. Unanimously all voted in favor.

APPROVAL OF MONTHLY BILL LISTCouncilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the monthly bill list and pay the bills as the money becomes available, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No discussion. Unanimously all voted in favor.

REPORTS OF COUNCIL

Councilwoman Lennert, "The Recreation Department would like to thank Larry Myers from the Sewickley Creek Watershed Association and Jim Pillsbury from the Westmoreland Conservation District for organizing an Earth Day event at Lynch Field on Saturday, April 23rd. We would also like to thank the volunteers from that day from the Elliott Company in Jeannette who helped paint the educational kiosks, signposts and picnic tables. The work they did there is greatly appreciated and everything looks really great. I had compliments on the picnic tables. The Recreation Office is taking registrations for the Tiny Tot Program. The first day of instruction will be May 20th. The fee is \$35 for residents and \$45 for non-residents. We will also start taking registrations on May 16th for our Youth Football Program. The fee for football is \$65 for residents and \$75 for non-residents. The Cheerleading Program will also start that same day but for returning cheerleaders. It will then open up for first-time cheerleaders on June 6th. The fee for cheerleading is \$40 for residents and \$50 for non-residents. If you have any questions please call the Recreation Department at 724-834-4880 or visit the City website at www.greensburgpa.org. On this past Saturday we had a Flea Fair at the arena. The arena took in \$440 in revenue from the yendors and we are also able to donate \$100 to the Humane Society from the donations collected at the door. We will be doing that again next spring. Down at the arena, Saturday, May 21st, the Hempfield Band will be holding their banquet. They have been holding the banquet down there for the last 10 years. The Mt. Odin Golf Course had its opening day on May 1st and it is in full swing up there. This concludes my report."

Councilwoman McCormick, reported by Councilman Finfrock, "On Monday, April 25th, the Department of Public Works began the summer work shift. Regular hours will be from 6:00 a.m. until 2:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The Street Department began paving. The first project was completed on April 20th when approximately 1,900 feet of golf cart paths were paved at Mt. Odin and last Tuesday a new apron was paved at the front of No. 6 Fire Station. The next paying project will be to resurface the parking lot at No. 1 Fire Station. If the weather cooperates, this work will begin later this week. With the awarding tonight of the bid for milling of streets to be resurfaced for this year, after the contractor completes that work the Street Department will immediately begin paving. The contractor who was hired to spray for the control of weeds was in on Saturday, April 30th. The work was done at locations as directed that include several playgrounds, Lynch Field, parking lots and City Hall. Jack's Run and the Ludwick playground will be addressed in early June. While assisting the City of Jeannette at a building fire on April 23rd our Fire Department ladder truck was damaged when a wall suddenly collapsed. As a result there is significant body damage to the right side compartments. There were no injuries, thankfully, and the aerial ladder was spared from being damaged. Both the insurance company and the truck manufacturer had representatives here last week to view and evaluate the damage. Sometime this week we should hear back from them with a plan to make the repairs. Finally, the new Fire Department pumper for Station 7 that was ordered last November is scheduled for delivery on Monday, May 16th. There were four members from the Fire Department who went to the assembly plant in Wisconsin last week to conduct the final inspection prior to delivery. That concludes the report."

- a. Planning and Development, Fire and Police Reports. Mayor Bell reviewed the Planning and Development, Fire and Police Reports. Copies of these reports may be obtained at the respective offices or the City Administration Office.
- b. Greensburg Community Days-May 26-May 29, 2016. Mayor Bell, "We'll be celebrating the 22nd anniversary of our popular four-day festival, and I encourage everyone in Greensburg and from the surrounding communities to kick off their summer fun at Greensburg Community Days. The event will include all the traditional festivities and favorites: a variety of craft and food vendors; free live music and entertainment; carnival rides; the E.C. Cruisers Car Show on Friday evening from 6:00-9:30; and the fabulous Zambelli fireworks at 9:30 on Saturday night."
- c. The Wayne Johnson Memorial Golf Outing-May 27, 2016. Mayor Bell, "This year we will hold the 8th Annual Memorial Golf Outing named in honor of former Councilman Wayne Johnson. All proceeds of this outing held at Mt. Odin Park benefit the Greensburg Recreation Department."
- d. SummerSounds. Mayor Bell, "The free Friday evening concert series begins with a rock and roll band, 'The Outer Vibe', at 7:00 p.m. on June 3, 2016. You can all visit www.summersounds.com for the complete summer schedule. I want to take the opportunity to thank the wonderful group of volunteers for their hard work at SummerSounds and their commitment to the series which celebrates music and our community."

ADOPTION OF BILLS AS ORDINANCES

Bill No. 1 as Ordinance No. 2063 – AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG AMENDING SCHEDULE IX OF §249-65 ENTITLED 'STOP INTERSECTIONS' OF CHAPTER 249 ENTITLED 'VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC' OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG. Mayor Bell, "Enactment of this Ordinance as introduced makes the intersection of Grove and Alexander a four-way stop."

Councilman Vesely MOVED to adopt Bill No. 1 as Ordinance No. 2063, and Councilman Finfrock SECONDED. No discussion. Roll call vote was taken. All voted unanimously to adopt Bill No. 1 as Ordinance No. 2063.

ENACTMENT OF RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 1230 – A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG, COUNTY OF WESTMORELAND, COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, DESIGNATING VOTING DELEGATES TO REPRESENT THE CITY OF GREENSBURG ON THE WESTMORELAND COUNTY TAX COLLECTION COMMITTEE. Mayor Bell, "The enactment of Resolution No. 1230 appoints Susan M. Trout as the Primary Voting Delegate and Kelsye A. Milliron as the First Alternate Voting Delegate for the remainder of 2016."

Councilman Finfrock MOVED to enact Resolution No. 1230, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No discussion. Roll call vote was taken. All voted unanimously to enact.

Resolution No. 1231 – A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENSBURG, COUNTY OF WESTMORELAND, COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL TO APPOINT THE FISCAL DIRECTOR/CITY TREASURER AND TAX COLLECTOR AS LIAISON BETWEEN THE GOVERNING BODY AND BERKHEIMER, THE DULY APPOINTED COLLECTOR OF LOCAL TAXES, FOR THE EXPRESS PURPOSE OF SHARING CONFIDENTIAL TAX INFORMATION FOR OFFICIAL PURPOSES. Mayor Bell, "Enactment of Resolution No. 1231 appoints the Fiscal Director/City Treasurer and Tax Collector, Kelsye A. Milliron, as the liaison for this purpose." Councilman Finfrock MOVED to enact Resolution No. 1231, and Councilwoman Lennert SECONDED. No discussion. Roll call vote was taken. All voted unanimously to enact.

COUNCIL APPROVAL

a. **Promotion to Sergeant.** Mayor Bell, "Council approval accepts the promotion of Patrolman Donald Cole to the rank of Sergeant effective May 9, 2016. Officer Cole has been with the Greensburg Police Department since 1994. His promotion to a leadership role is very well-deserved."

Councilman Vesely MOVED to approve the promotion, and Councilwoman Lennert SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the promotion.

At this time Mayor Bell administered the Oath of Office to Sergeant Donald Cole.

b. Filling of Detective's Position. Mayor Bell, "Council approval accepts the movement of Sergeant Charles Irvin to the position and rank of Detective effective May 9, 2016." Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the position and rank, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve.

At this time Mayor Bell administered the Oath of Office to Detective Charles Irvin.

- change of Rates for Two (2) Seasonal Employees. Mayor Bell, "Council approval changes the rates of Erik Angiolieri and Jeffrey Livingood initially hired at the April Meeting at \$8.25 per hour as seasonal maintenance employees at Mt. Odin Park to the rate of \$10 per hour effective May 9, 2016."

 Councilwoman Lennert MOVED to approve the change of rates, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the change of rates.
- d. Appointment to the Civil Service Commission. Mayor Bell, "Council approval accepts the appointment of David Redinger to the Commission effective today to fill the unexpired position of Dr. John Scassellati until July 9, 2016."

 Councilman Vesely MOVED to approve the appointment, and Councilwoman Lennert SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the appointment.
- e. Termination of Police Patrolman. Mayor Bell, "Council approval terminates Justin Adams effective April 27, 2016 which is during his probationary period." Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the termination, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the termination.

- f. Reappointment to the Aerobic Center Authority. Mayor Bell, "Council approval reappoints Dr. Calvin Kier to the Authority for another 3-year term until May 14, 2019." Councilwoman Lennert MOVED to approve the reappointment, and Councilman Finfrock SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve.
- g. Reappointment to the Aerobic Center Authority. Mayor Bell, "Council approval reappoints J. Edward Hutchinson to the Authority for another 3-year term until May 14, 2019."
 Councilwoman Lennert MOVED to approve the reappointment, and Councilman Finfrock SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve.
- h. Slate of Projects Recommended by the Historic and Architectural Review Board (HARB) for Issuance of Certificates of Appropriateness. Mayor Bell, "Council approval of tonight's slate includes four (4) properties located in the Gateway District: at 212 East Pittsburgh Street on property owned by John and Melanie Harris, John Harris is the applicant for new signage; at 159 East Otterman Street, on another property owned by John and Melanie Harris, Bob Gonze of Blue Sky Sign Company is the applicant for new signage for the Shalimar Bazaar; at 550 East Pittsburgh Street owned by the Quatrini Rafferty Partnership, Dennis Rafferty is the applicant for new signage; and Susan Baker, the owner of property at 502 North Main Street is the applicant for a façade and preservation project. Bob Gonze is also the applicant for new signage for Sun Dawg at one (1) property located in the Downtown, Gateway and Historic District at 35 East Pittsburgh Street owned by Duane Ponko."

Councilman Vesely MOVED to approve the slate of projects recommended for issuance of Certificates of Appropriateness, and Councilwoman Lennert SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the slate of projects.

i. Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the City of Greensburg and the Police Officers of the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) 56 of the City of Greensburg. Mayor Bell, "Council approval accepts the MOU agreeing to the following: to test and promote four (4) Sergeant positions in 2016 with the promotions based upon the results of a pending Sergeant's test as well as the outcome of current grievance and labor filings; the City and the FOP are in agreement that there are no eligible or willing candidates for the Lieutenant positions at this time in accordance with current Civil Service promotion procedures; additionally, after the Sergeants have had one (1) year of supervisory experience as Sergeants, the City will test to fill open Lieutenant positions with the qualified Sergeants; the City and FOP further agree this particular test for the position of Lieutenant will only be open to the current group of Sergeants promoted off of the above test and/or the results of pending labor filings; any future test for Lieutenants will again be open to all eligible candidates. In addition, the City and FOP agree this MOU is not precedent setting and cannot be referenced in any current grievance procedures." Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the MOU, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the MOU.

- j. Agreement between Meter Feeder, Inc. and the City of Greensburg. Mayor Bell, "Approval of the agreement provides parking patrons an alternative credit card payment option at metered parking throughout the City utilizing a smart phone app with the installation of stickers on the meters. Implementation of the complete parking program shall cost the City \$1,500 and includes 24 months of Long Term Evolution (LTE) internet connectivity, on-site training, app licensing, and equipment." Councilman Vesely MOVED to approve the agreement, and Councilwoman Lennert SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the agreement.
- k. Purchase of General Ledger Accounting Software. Mayor Bell, "Council approval accepts the purchase of AccuFund Professional Edition Accounting Software from EMK, Inc. in the amount of \$33,028.75. This price includes the AccuFund Accounting Suite, support and maintenance, as well as, implementation, consulting, and training." Councilman Finfrock MOVED to approve the purchase, and Councilman Vesely SECONDED. No discussion. All voted unanimously to approve the purchase.

The City of Greensburg Planning & Development Department is pleased to report that four (4) commercial properties were purchased within Downtown Greensburg the first quarter of 2016. The total real estate value changing ownership was \$465,000. The properties included a 9-unit apartment building @ 13 N. Maple Avenue, a parking lot @ 55 E Pittsburgh Street, a small office building @ 320 N. Maple Avenue (which had been a tax exempt property for over 60 years) and a former dentist's office @ 309 S. Maple Avenue. The purpose of the purchase ranges from increasing a

The purpose of the purchase ranges from increasing a portfolio of real estate by an investment group to owning a building instead of leasing an office suite, to starting a new

business. Regardless of the motive, the investment in downtown commercial real estate indicates a confidence in the appreciation of real estate values and the strength of specific market drivers.

The recent number of inquiries in downtown commercial buildings and the surrounding real estate market suggests interest in downtown Greensburg will remain strong in the 2nd and 3rd quarters of 2016.
